St Thomas Aquinas OP

When Pope St John Paul II wrote his magisterial encyclical "Faith and Reason", he included in chapter IV a section on "the enduring originality of the thought of St Thomas Aquinas" (par 43-44). Aquinas' work has endured, not without robust challenges, but in many respects it was original.

His output was monumental. This 13th Century Dominican friar wrote about 8,000,000 words in his 49 years of life (from 1225-1274). It is difficult to approach Aquinas without some reliable guide as to where to start and how to read his medieval style.

Aquinas began his academic work before the distinction between philosophy and theology had hardened. His first lectures were commentaries on various books of the Bible. His first long written work was his *Summa Contra Gentiles* - "Summary Against Unbelievers", which we treated last week. For the most part Aquinas relied on the available knowledge and philosophy without recourse to Christian revelation. This made his first major work available also to Jewish and Muslim thinkers.

Undoubtedly his great work was the "Summary of Christian Theology" or *Summa Theologiae*. This work was planned in three stages, but Aquinas died before he could complete the two million-words self-imposed task.

The first part of the "Summary of Theology" was concerned with God and with human nature; the second part was divided into two sections, the first dealing with the goals of human life, and questions of law and grace, whereas the second focussed on specific moral questions. The third unfinished part was directly concerned with Jesus, the Church, prayer and the sacraments.

The story is told that one morning while celebrating Mass, Thomas had a mystical experience and as a result ceased writing altogether. Asked about why he made such an untypical decision he commented on his vast output and said: "To me to whole thing is like so much straw!" His students completed Part III and Thomas died a little later in a Cistercian monastery while en route to the Council of Lyons (1274). Despite Aquinas' cyclopaedic knowledge of the faith and his immense care in examining all kinds of objections, his reputation initially remained the preserve of his Dominican family. The Universities of Paris and Oxford banned Aquinas, and his reputation suffered as scholasticism (i.e. the educational tradition of the medieval schools of thought) began to fade. Thomas Aquinas had to wait for Pope Leo XIII in his encyclical, *Aeterni Patris* (1879), to grant him universal Catholic favour.

Unfortunately, the secular world took little notice of Leo XIII's praise of Aquinas and resented the idea of a specific Catholic philosophy. As Aquinas began to fade in Catholic circles, he became an object of study and debate elsewhere.

Staunch Catholic defenders tend to refer to Saint Thomas, while secular philosophers refer to Aquinas. Fortunately, there are important Catholic thinkers who can bridge both worlds.

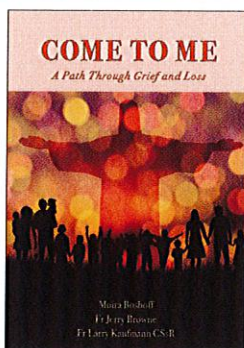
Pope St John Paul II highlighted the enduring originality of the thought of Aquinas by arguing that a close study of him shows how he harmonised faith and reason, natural and supernatural, secularism and the radicality of the Gospel. For Aquinas, the background to all knowledge is the horizon of Divine Wisdom in which we live and move and have our being.

In all these things we conquer overwhelmingly. (Romans 8:37)

Julius Caesar. Alexander the Great. Napoleon Bonaparte. Genghis Khan. What do these men have in common? They were among the world's greatest conquerors. They waged military campaigns that took them far and wide, forming mighty empires along the way.

Would you include Jesus in that list? Or St. Paul? Or yourself, for that matter? We don't think of Christ, or Christians in general, as conquerors. Jesus died an ignoble death at the hands of the Romans. St. Paul was beheaded by the same empire. They looked more like the conquered than conquerors. Even today many Christians are martyred by those in power.

And yet through his sacrifice on the cross and his resurrection from the dead, Jesus conquered the greatest enemies of all: sin and death. And because of our baptism into Christ, that's a victory we all share in-no matter what befalls us in this life.

Paul's words must have comforted the early Christians whenever they experienced persecution for their faith. Even when it looked like they were losing," they knew they were actually "winning." They trusted that not even the worst calamity could separate them from Jesus!

These verses can bring you comfort as well. You may be experiencing the kind of anguish and distress that St. Paul described. Or maybe you are repeatedly losing" to a certain temptation. Whatever the case, know that as you cling to the Lord, you will "win" in the end. One day Jesus will welcome you into his heavenly kingdom, and everything will be made right and beautiful.

Until then, remember that God will never separate himself from you; his love is too strong, too real and solid. And through that love, you too will triumph over sin, death, and all the trials of life. You too will be a conqueror.

"Jesus, may I never be separated from your love!"
